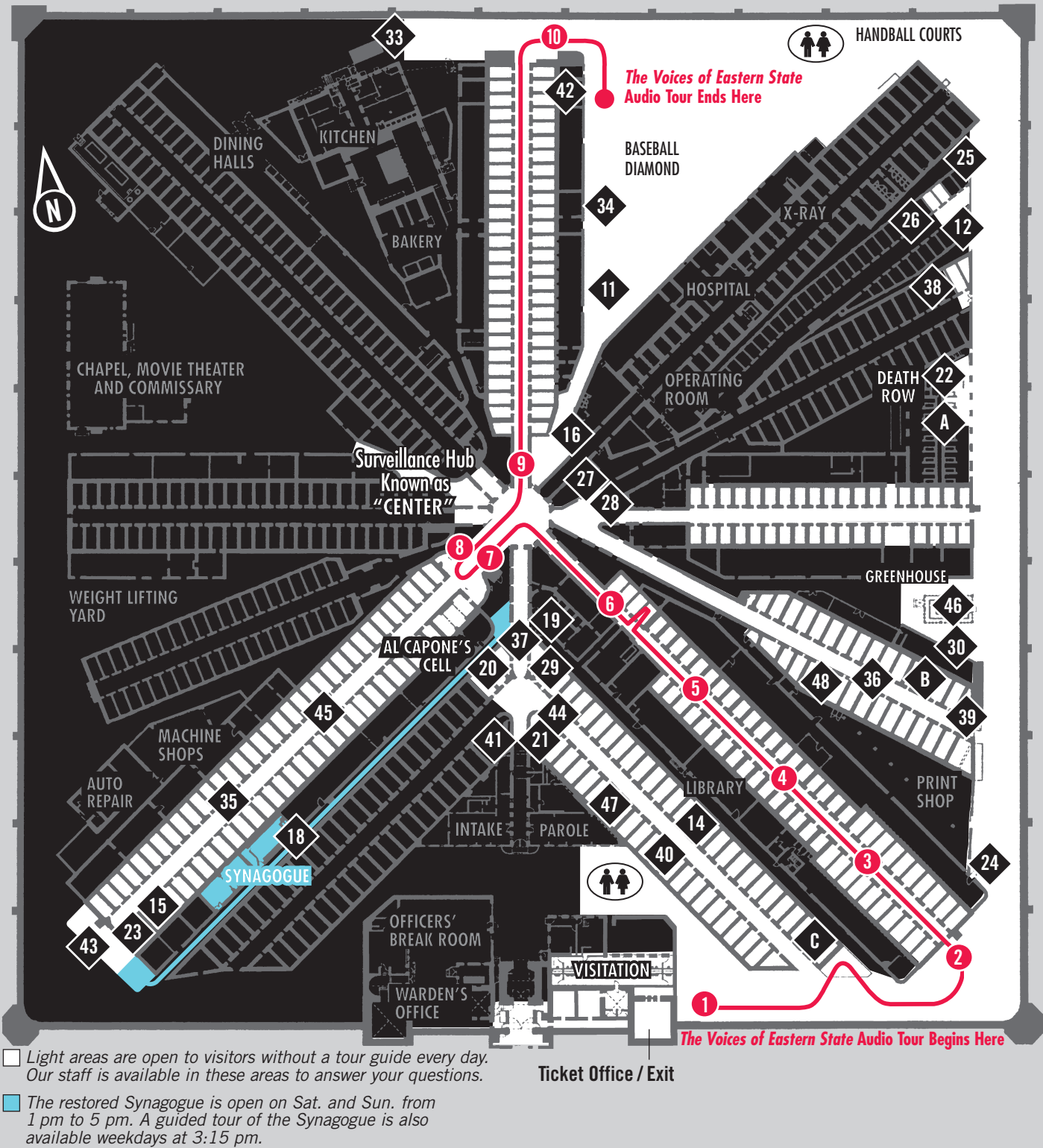

More than 100 men escaped from Eastern State during its 142 year history. But how? A tour guide describes three escapes in detail, illustrating how they changed over time at the penitentiary.

Life Behind the Walls

More than 75,000 men and women once served time behind these walls. What was life like? An Eastern State tour guide compares the lives of inmates during the prison's long history.

Prison Uprisings

Inmates gathered to protest conditions they felt were unfair nearly a dozen times during Eastern State's history. A tour guide leads the group to locations of the 1961 riot and other inmate uprisings.

Synagogue

Eastern State Penitentiary may have had the first synagogue inside an American prison. This sacred place is newly restored with a special exhibit. Also open Saturday and Sunday from 1 pm to 5 pm for walk-in visitors.
